EXPLANATION OF FOLDER

This folder is primarily for the use of group and squadron commanders and intelligence officers in the planning of operations and the briefing of crews. Neither the folder nor any part of it may be taken into the air on offensive missions.

Targets and objective areas are numbered from one to infinity within each country. These numbers are combined into a code showing the country, objective area, and target. For example, 91.7-145 indicates Japanese Pacific Islands (91), Pescadores (7), and TARGET 145 in the Japanese Pacific Islands series.

Supplementing the objective folder, target charts are provided separately for the use of air crews. Each chart is centered on a target; it spots other targets lying within a four-mile radius; and it identifies landmarks within a twenty-mile radius. The charts are numbered according to the targets on which they are centered.

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SUMMARY AND EVALUATION OF PESCADORES ISLANDS

NOTE: This folder is the result of an effort to obtain the best information thus far available in the U. S. A. Every effort should be made in the field to correct by photo reconnaissance the data given

DESCRIPTION AND IMPORTANCE: The Pescadores are a group of small barren islands about 30 nautical miles west of Taiwan and about 320 nautical miles NE of Hong Kong on the China coast, extending from approximately 23° 11′ to 23° 54′ N latitude. They are covered with low hills, the highest known being less than 200 feet. All food has to be obtained from Taiwan or China.

These islands are important only as a naval and air base. The harbor at Bako (Makyu) south of the chief island Hoko is the only good natural harbor in the Taiwan-Pescadores area. It is large and affords anchorage for ships of all sizes. There is a minor naval base called the Ansan base on Observatory Island, just west of Hoko, connected with it by a concrete or stone bridge. This base includes a small dry dock (400 ft by 70 ft), shops capable of making minor repairs, a wireless station, mine and torpedo storage, oil and coal storage, and fueling facilities. A larger dock capable of taking a 10,000-ton cruiser is reported but not confirmed. The harbor facilities are located at the Ansan naval base and at the town of Bako.

An important cruiser, submarine, and motor torpedo boat base is located in a narrow inlet NE of the Ansan base near Kotei on the west side of Hoko Island. The supplies for this base are reported to be stored underground.

A third anchorage is reported north of the island of Daishoto, one of the southerly islands of the group. Nothing is known about the installations on this island.

Two usable air fields are reported on the main island of Hoko. The Keimo-U airdrome with a number of hangars and underground gasoline storage is located NE of the Ansan base. The second is at Risei-Kaku on the SE point of Hoko. This airdrome is reported to have underground hangars and storage. In the past seaplanes have been based at Bako harbor. Installations are camouflaged.

The only targets not mentioned above are the storehouses, barracks, etc., connected with the naval bases and their defenses. Oil storage of about 40,000 tons and gasoline storage of 440,000 gallons are reported on Hoko Island. The total may be much larger.

DEFENSES AND VULNERABILITY: The Pescadores lie in the narrow strait between Taiwan and China, making approach without detection difficult. The main and outlying islands are strongly protected against attack by either sea or air. There are twenty or more airdromes on nearby Taiwan, from which the Pescadores can be defended from air or sea attack.

The only known means of land transportation between the defense positions is by road. A number of bridges or causeways connect Hoko with the outer islands.

Telegraph and telephone lines connect the defense installations, and the Ansan naval base is connected by cable with Gyoo Island and Taiwan.




